

Emotional Intelligence: Building Emotional Bonds with Your Children

This month, in our "Parents as Learners" session, I presented a talk titled "Emotional Intelligence: Building Emotional Bonds with Your Children." In this article, I'll summarise the discussion and talk about emotional intelligence (EQ), which is essential for human well-being.

What is EQ?

EQ stands for "Emotional Intelligence Quotient," which is the ability to understand and deal with our own and others' feelings. This concept was introduced by an American psychologist named Daniel Goleman in his book "Emotional Intelligence" in 1995. While IQ measures cognitive abilities like math and language skills, EQ focuses on non-cognitive abilities like cooperation and communication, which are crucial for building friendships and social relationships.



Benefits of Having High EQ

People with high EQ have various advantages. They are empathetic, meaning they can maintain good relationships with others, consider their friends' feelings, offer appropriate support, and accept support from others when they face difficulties. They can regulate their emotions well, handle anger or sadness appropriately, maintain positive attitudes, and quickly recover from failures. Additionally, they have high self-esteem, actively take on challenges, persevere until the end, and accept themselves, leading to tolerance towards others.

On the other hand, people with low EQ may find it difficult to empathise with others, experience troubles in relationships, and frequently encounter negative emotions.

The Importance of Developing EQ in Childhood

Childhood is a crucial time for forming attachments, which provides children with a sense of security when they are with close family members. This feeling of security is vital for building relationships and is one of the foundations of non-cognitive abilities. By experiencing a sense of security during childhood, children can develop EQ. It impacts their self-awareness, relationships, and overall happiness throughout their lives.

Why Developing EQ in Childhood Matters?

People with high EQ can understand their own and others' emotions and communicate effectively, which plays essential roles in relationships and leadership. Therefore, fostering a sense of security and developing EQ in childhood is critical for future happiness and success.

How Parents Can Foster Children's EQ

Parents can help by assisting children in understanding their emotions and thoughts, encouraging them to express themselves, and providing a sense of security when they express their feelings. Good communication is crucial for understanding children's emotions and providing them with a sense of being heard.

Tips for Effective Communication with Children

- Maintain eye contact and speak at their eye level.
- Listen actively, nodding or using affirmations.
- Repeat their words to show understanding.
- Avoid interrupting; listen attentively when they start talking.
- · Use "HOW?" rather than "WHY?" to encourage
- · Refrain from evaluation or criticism.
- · Avoid denial (Do not use "but").
- Listen while simulating their experiences, like watching a movie.

By following these tips, parents can support their children's EQ development. Additionally, by connecting with children's emotions and sharing their own, parents can strengthen the bond with their children. By "listening to our children sincerely," we can enhance their EQ, increase their lifelong happiness, and deepen our bonds with our children!

Exploring University Options

Choosing the right university can be both challenging and exciting. There are so many options to choose from that it is impossible to explore them all. Having a clear idea of the factors to consider and reliable information sources is crucial.

The first step is making a list of the factors that are important to you. For some, the geographic location and climate might be top priorities. For others, it might be the affordability of the school. These are both valid factors that need to be considered. Let's make a starter list of the factors we need to consider:

Academic programs and reputation: Does the university offer the course you wish to study? Are they a 'good' university in that field?

Entry requirements: Do you fulfill the requirements to get admission to this university?

Location: Which country do you want to study in? Do you prefer an urban or rural setting? How far from home is it? Does the campus area offer opportunities for potential jobs?

Size: Do you want a large or a smaller campus? The university's size will impact class sizes, faculty-student ratio, and overall community.

Financial considerations: Can you afford the tuition fees and living expenses? Do they offer scholarships?

Facilities and resources: Do you have access to laboratories or any other resources you might need for your studies?

After graduation: What is the job placement rate? Do they offer career services?

These are just a few factors to consider when making your university list. Even with a clear checklist, gathering information from each university's website individually can be time-consuming. Fortunately, there are reliable sources out there that can help you with your search. While these sources are reliable, it is recommended that you double-check the information on the university's website.

Grades 9 and 10 have been busy in the chemistry laboratory. In the Grade 9 chemistry lab, the young scientists took on the challenge of developing a chemical lab procedure. Their mission? Unravel the mystery of unknown chemicals found at a crime scene, armed only with their knowledge of acids and bases. Picture this: test tubes clinking, minds buzzing with curiosity, as they skillfully crafted a procedure that would reveal the secrets hidden within those elusive substances.

But the excitement didn't stop there! Once the procedure was perfected, our fearless Grade 9 scientists dove headfirst into action, testing the unknown chemicals with precision. The revelation came in the form of pH magic, as they identified and unlocked the secrets concealed within the mysterious compounds. As the final touch, each student submitted a comprehensive report using the state-of-the-art Bulldog Crime Lab ManageBac System (BCLMBS), showcasing their prowess in the world of forensic chemistry.

Meanwhile, over in Grade 10, a different kind of chemistry magic was brewing. Grade 10 took on the challenge of investigating the factors that influence the rate of a chemical reaction. Imagine the laboratory alive with energy as students explored the impact of temperature, particle size (surface area), and the concentration of reactants on the fascinating collision of particles. The Grade 10 scientists unleashed their creativity using common household chemicals to demonstrate one of these influential factors. It was a symphony of reactions, a visual feast of bubbling beakers and colorful concoctions as they showcased their understanding of Criterion B and C assessments.

These chemistry adventures have ignited a spark of passion for science within our Grades 9 and 10 students. The school laboratory has become a stage for discovery, where the magic of chemistry unfolds in every experiment. 















Digital Photography Techniques and Composition in Grade 4:

These speeches aim to educate younger students about how they are embodying scholarship, leadership, and character through various service activities throughout the school year. This initiative provides younger students with the opportunity to begin considering future leadership roles and responsibilities. Additionally, for NHS candidates, this public speaking opportunity serves as a chance to deeply reflect on their achievements before their formal induction into the organization at the Induction Ceremony in May.



Marist Brothers Honor Society (MHS)

The final CPR training session for this school year took place on February 7 after school. Approximately 20 students from the Fundraising Committee and Community Event Committee participated. Two representatives from the Japan Red Cross Hyogo Division were invited to conduct the training session. They provided a comprehensive lecture on effective CPR techniques in public settings. Following the lecture, all students had the opportunity to practice CPR using manikins and AED machines. During a reflection meeting following one of these sessions, a senior student remarked, "After four years of CPR training in MHS, I finally feel confident enough to take action and assist others in emergency situations." We extend our sincere gratitude to the Japan Red Cross Hyogo Division for their invaluable assistance and guidance in training our students to effectively respond to emergencies and save lives.





Following the CPR training, Grade 12 student Aaryan Bhasin, Upper School Student Council Treasurer, and Grade 11 student Sehej Chadha, MHS/NHS Treasurer, met with representatives from the Japan Red Cross Hyogo Division to present a donation of 106,866 yen. This donation will be utilized to support the 2024 Noto Earthquake victims in Ishikawa prefecture. The Red Cross staff expressed their gratitude to our student leaders and assured that the funds will be used to aid the victims in rebuilding their lives. We extend our gratitude to all students, parents, and staff of MBIS for their generous contributions on the special casual day held on February 2 to support the earthquake victims.



On February 9, a total of 26 MHS students proudly represented our school and assisted during our Open House, where 40 prospective students and their families visited our campus. Our student volunteers guided each visiting family on a school tour, showcasing our classrooms, gym, art room, and library. As they toured the school, the visitors engaged in discussions about school life. The Student Ambassadors shared personal anecdotes about why they cherish their school experience. The sight of students with big smiles enjoying this small surprise warmed our hearts. We hope everyone stays warm, healthy, and resilient during the coldest month of the year.





February, known as the month of love, saw our MHS Fundraising Committee organize a Valentine Bake Sale on Valentine's Day. Generously donated baked goods from Ms. Buchanan, Mrs. Carter, Mr. Peterson, Mr. Lipp, and Mr. Ranni, including donuts, brownies, cupcakes, and cookies, were available for purchase. Additionally, committee members baked cinnamon rolls at school prior to the event. The proceeds of 9,700 JPY will be allocated towards MHS charity activities and community service initiatives in the future. MHS Junior members have been actively engaged in weekly meetings during Friday lunchtimes to advance the farming project for Semester 2. Personal Project

Some students have been taking great initiatives to proceed with their own and unique personal service projects throughout the school year. Congratulations to the student below on her service achievement for the month.

Potato Project (written by Grade 10 Michelle Ranni)

With assistance from local farmers and a potato processing factory in Nishi-ku, Kobe, I've been able to create packaged dried potatoes using the ones harvested last year. These tender and sweet potatoes were specifically prepared for children battling cancer. Last year, I donated around 10 kg of potatoes with the help of MHS students, and the staff at the Child Chemo House expressed their gratitude. Wanting to extend my help to more children, I brainstormed ways to do so. By processing the potatoes into a healthy snack, they can last longer, allowing children to eat them gradually over an extended period. I came up with the idea of transforming these potatoes into snack products. Approximately 4 kg of potatoes were transformed into 9 small packages of dried potatoes. These potatoes were first baked, then dried to enhance their sweetness, with no chemicals or preservatives added. Just before Valentine's Day on February 10, I visited the Child Chemo House to donate these packaged sweet potato snacks, which I named "Hoshi-chan," to the children staying there. "Hoshi" means "dry" and also "star." I hope that this humble potato snack can be a source of hope, much like a star, for the local community. I would like to express my gratitude to the farmers from various farms in Nishi-ku for their contribution to the successful production of this product.
