

May 2024 IB World Exams are scheduled to take place from April 24th to May 16th. Our Grade 12 students have been diligently reviewing for the exams based on their performance on the mock exams and the feedback provided by their teachers. We extend our best wishes to all our students on their examinations.

Future of IB World Exams: Digital examinations in the Diploma Programme (DP)

IB World Schools have shared their feedback with the IB through a survey, the results of which will help shape the future of the IB DP exams. According to the survey results (ibo.org):

- · A majority, 74%, express readiness to transition by 2026, with an even more optimistic 84% prepared for the shift by 2027.
- · 77% of respondents conveyed excitement and positivity about embracing digital DP examinations.
- · Concerns were voiced regarding staff expertise, internet reliability, and device availability.

The IB ensures a gradual transition, allowing time for readiness.

Marist Brothers International School has been an IB World School since 2017. We take pride in being part of an intellectual community dedicated to shaping future generations for a better and more peaceful world.

As an IB World School, we are committed to continuous growth and improvement. To this end, MBIS has taken the initiative to become an IB continuum school by adding the Middle Years Programme (MYP) and Primary Years Programme (PYP). Since September 2023, we have been diligently undergoing the authorization process, which involves a comprehensive review of unit plans, teaching and learning strategies, assessment practices, and school policies. Our teachers have been working wholeheartedly to meet the requirements and demonstrate our readiness to teach all three IB programmes. We have kept our students and families well-informed throughout this process and are happy to address any queries.

Families of Grades 5-9 are cordially invited to the third session of our MYP afternoon series on **April 15th**, where we will delve into MYP assessment.

Fostering Children's Emotional Development through Communication

I discussed nurturing your child's EQ (Emotional Intelligence) in last month's newsletter. This month, let's explore how to communicate with them effectively and how children with high EQ communicate.

Communicating with children effectively involves focusing on the following points, as I mentioned last month:

- · Maintain eye contact and speak at their eye level.
- Listen actively, nodding or using affirmations.
- · Repeat their words to show understanding.
- · Avoid interrupting; listen attentively when they start talking.
- · Use "HOW?" rather than "WHY?" to encourage elaboration.
- Refrain from evaluation or criticism.
- · Avoid denial (Do not use "but").
- Listen while simulating their experiences, like watching a movie.



There are specific techniques for active listening, such as open-ended questions, verbal cues, and simulation.

1. Ask Open-ended Questions

Open-ended questions encourage children to provide free responses. Examples include, "How did you spend your weekend?" or "What's your favourite food?" Using "Why" and "How" within the framework of 5W1H (Who, What, When, Why, How) prompts detailed answers and invites children to explore their thoughts/feelings.

2. Respond with Verbal Cues

Verbal cues help navigate and deepen conversations. Cues like "In what way?" "How did you feel at that time?" "What was it like?" "And then what happened?" can enrich the discussion.

3. Listen with Simulation

Empathising with children's experiences as if immersing them in a storybook or a movie helps you understand their emotions and deepens your communication.

When children develop high EQ communication skills, their way of speaking and expression change. Children with high EQ are sensitive to their own emotions and experiences, leading to richer expression. For example, if we compare a boring diary entry to one that talks about feelings, we can see a big difference. Similarly, in everyday conversations, incorporating emotional expressions contributes to richer communication.

While we've discussed methods for nurturing children's EQ, it's important to remember that perfection isn't necessary for daily life. What matters is remembering these tips and gradually putting them into practice.

Good communication between parents and children is crucial for their growth. Actively engaging in dialogue fosters children's EQ and deepens mutual understanding, creating strong bonds. Let's start practising these techniques today.

March saw the conclusion of our Varsity Soccer seasons, which ended on pretty high notes. The Varsity Men traveled down to Iwakuni to participate in the Perry Cup against a contingent of US military base schools and large school invites. Throughout the tough, 2-day tournament, the Bulldogs showed poise, composure, and superb play, beating Edgren 4 - 1 to earn a rare trip to the semi-finals against Yokota. A fiercely contested match ensued, with the Bulldogs taking a 1-0 lead in at half on a PK. A flurry of attacks from Yokota erupted in the second half, but the defense held fast and secured the first Finals appearance in the Perry Cup for Marist. They matched up against the hosts, the MC Perry Samurais, and fell behind early, 1-0. However, the Bulldogs equalized right before the half on a brilliant free kick from Rui Shimono, seizing momentum going into the break. Coming out for the second half, the Bulldogs made sure to maintain their aggressiveness and relentlessly attacked. This led to another goal by Rui Shimono to take the lead, one they never relinquished as they won for the first time in history!

Rui's performance earned him offensive player recognition as Jin Ushio, Jazz Clarey, and Giuliano Tempesta all earned All-Tournament honors. Congratulations to our Men's Varsity Program.







The following weekend saw both Varsity teams travel to compete in their respective WJAA tournaments - the men to Nagoya and the women to Iwakuni. Both teams performed well in their respective pool play, which netted appearances in the semi-finals for both teams.

On the men's side, they matched up against MC Perry again, in another hotly contested match. Though the Bulldogs dominated possession, and the game, a deflected corner kick for the Samurai found the back of the net and knocked the Bulldogs into the 3rd place game.

On the women's side, they matched up against the EJ King Cobras, the same opponents they faced in last year's championship. Though their first match was an offensive shootout, both teams implemented strategies to lock-down the opponent, which led to a 0-0 draw at half. Tight-marking and quick counterattacks dominated the second half from both teams and timely substitutions kept the pace intact. The Cobras managed to get the ball to their captain in the closing minutes of the game, who rifled a shot into the back of the net despite being sandwiched between two defenders. The score stood 1-0 and left the Bulldogs playing for third.

Despite the setback for the two teams, they both rebounded against their opponents (Nagoya) in their respective 3rd place games. With dominant performances, both teams ended their tournaments with victories. On the men's side, Jin Ushio earned tournament recognition for his play in midfield, while Keila Stang and Riko Noda were selected as All-Tournament players for their tireless defensive work on the women.
