

The MBIS MYP consultation visit took place on May 30th and 31st.

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme (DP)

IB DP Year 2 students celebrated the end of May 2024 exam session on May 17. We hope that the two years of hard work pay off and that every one of our students receives the well-deserved results.



Many of you may have heard the speculations about the exam leakage. I would like to share with you the message that the IB communicated to the community.

04 May 2024

The IB is aware of speculation that aspects of May 2024 exam content have been shared online by students.

In response to the significant amount of misinformation currently circulating online, we would like to reassure our community that students will receive valid, recognized and meaningful results.

To date, there is no evidence of widespread cheating and we are confident that this activity remains at the fringes of what is otherwise a standard exam session.

We have taken immediate action to investigate the claims and have discovered a very small number of students appear to have engaged in online "time zone cheating". Time zone cheating occurs when students who have completed their examinations share what they can recall from memory about the exam questions on social media before other students take the examination.

We are acutely aware that IB students around the world have worked tirelessly to be ready to sit their exams and have held themselves to the highest of academic standards, and we are taking active steps to ensure that the integrity of the remainder of the exam session remains intact.

Puberty Class Report

This month, we conducted puberty education classes for Grades 4 to 8. The school counselor assisted in supporting students' mental health as part of these lessons. Here is a report on the activities.



Grade 4 & 5 Classes

In a 45-minute health class, we introduced physical and emotional changes during puberty using our health textbook "Harcourt Health and Fitness" and some videos. We also covered important topics such as hygiene, emotional well-being, and self-care. These lessons are crucial for developing self-management skills and confidence for students entering puberty.

Grade 6 Classes

For Grade 6 students, we organized more comprehensive health and puberty classes over two mornings. The sessions were conducted separately for boys and girls. Mr. Pilgrim addressed the boys, and Ms. Sakurai addressed the girls, covering topics like reproductive anatomy and physiology, sex and gender, changes during puberty, menstruation and hygiene, and conception. The information provided was tailored to the developmental stage of Grade 6 students, explaining conception and pregnancy in an age-appropriate manner. Each class included time for answering students' questions and opportunities for them to ask anonymously.

We used the book "It's Perfectly Normal: Changing Bodies, Growing Up, Sex, and Sexual Health" by Robie H. Harris. This comprehensive textbook on puberty and health was given to students to take home. The book is also available in our library. Additionally, we utilized the YouTube channel AMAZE Org as part of our classes, which can also be a useful resource for parents.

Grade 7 Classes

Grade 7 sexual health classes were conducted by Mr Stang and assisted by Ms Sakurai as part of health education. Although there was some overlap with the Grade 6 content, these classes included more advanced topics like the reproductive system, puberty changes, intercourse, conception, pregnancy and birth, gender and sexuality, decision-making, and hygiene. Considering students' varied levels of prior knowledge, we provided a comprehensive program.

Grade 8 Classes

Grade 8 sexual health classes were conducted by Mr Stang. They covered puberty changes, intercourse, conception, pregnancy and birth, gender and sexuality, decision-making, hygiene, sexually transmitted illnesses, and how to prevent them.

Diversity and Acceptance

Another key theme of our lessons was understanding that everyone is different. We emphasized that there is no right or wrong way to grow and that everyone has personal preferences, and we provided opportunities to think about diversity and acceptance.

Student Engagement and Future Implementation

Students participated enthusiastically, sometimes giggling with embarrassment but generally engaging seriously and asking questions. Most of them seemed to understand the content well. We also distributed samples of sanitary products and Japanese booklets on menstruation to Grade 5 and 6 girls. These booklets contain detailed explanations with photos of various types of sanitary products available in Japan, which can be very helpful.

These puberty lessons are a first step in helping students understand themselves and build healthy lifestyles and relationships. Puberty is a time of many changes, and it is important for children to have accurate knowledge and appropriate support in order to make wise choices. We encourage parents to discuss these topics openly at home and create an environment where children feel safe to express their questions and concerns.

Admissions Team at Open Apply Workshop

In our ongoing effort to enhance our admissions process, the Marist Admissions Team attended a workshop at The British School in Tokyo, focused on utilizing the Open Apply platform. The use of OA, which Marist implemented in late 2022, has transformed our admissions process by moving from a paper-based to a fully online system. Prospective families can book school tours, which we offer twice daily, fill out applications, upload grade reports, send recommendation forms (Marist format) directly to their teachers, and even have interviews online if they are not yet in the Kansai area. The workshop provided us with training on latest features and techniques to improve data management and enhance communication with prospective families.

During the workshop, the team connected with admissions officers from over 30 international schools in Japan and around the world. This networking opportunity allowed us to share and gather valuable information on various aspects of the admissions process, including application requirements, the evaluation process, utilizing OA's features for marketing, and general applicant trends.

One notable trend many schools, including Marist, have observed is a growing interest from mainland China. We have so far accepted 7 students from China to start with us in August 2024. We continue to attract diverse students from around the globe and have currently accepted over 80 new students representing 18 different nationalities for the 2024-2025 school year.

We are excited about the positive changes OA allows us to bring and hope to implement new strategies gained from the workshop. Thank you to all the faculty and staff who continually support Admissions, stopping to greet and chat with families touring our campus and inviting them into the classrooms. Our community, care, and learning environment leave a lasting impression, helping families feel confident about choosing Marist Brothers.

In the bustling corridors of MBIS, vibrant displays of scientific inquiry and creativity have taken shape. Students in grades 7 through 9 have embarked on an educational journey, transforming blank canvases into colorful, informative wall posters that delve into complex scientific concepts.

Grade 7 students have focused their artistic and scientific prowess on creating detailed posters about Earthquake Sensors. These young scientists have not only explored the technological mechanisms behind these sensors but have also examined their crucial role in disaster preparedness and mitigation. The detailed diagrams and interactive elements included in these posters help make the intricate technology understandable at a glance, demonstrating the students' deep engagement with the topic.

Moving up to Grade 8, the students tackled the profound and perennial question of the Origins of Life on Earth. Their posters are a patchwork of scientific theories, each illustrating different hypotheses about how life might have begun. From the primordial soup theory to the latest advancements in astrobiology, these presentations offer a comprehensive overview of the scientific community's quest to understand our very beginnings.

Grade 9 students, under the guidance of their peers Touma Miller, Kokomi Oshima, and Tomoko Senda, have reached even further into the cosmos with their exploration of The Big Bang and the origins of our universe. These posters serve as a gateway to understanding the fundamental aspects of cosmology, engaging viewers with timelines, celestial images, and explanations of cosmic background radiation.

At MBIS, our MYP Science approach is to make learning a dynamic and interactive experience, encouraging students to engage deeply with subject matter and present their understanding in creative ways. These projects not only help students learn about scientific facts and theories but also aids them in developing crucial skills such as research, teamwork, and communication.






In a rematch of last year's championship, the Falcons struck first, hoping to put the Bulldogs on their heels and the wind out of their sails.

In total, 14,300 JPY was raised, and this profit will soon be sent to the organization.
