## MESSAGE FROM THE IB DP COORDINATOR

As we begin the 2024-2025 academic year, there's noticeable energy throughout the school. Our Grade 12 students are engaged in their studies, ensuring that they balance the requirements of their second year in the programme with the busy process of university applications. Meanwhile, our Grade 11 students have been extensively involved in sessions to learn about the expectations of the subjects and the core elements in the IB Diploma Programme, aiming to frame their journey in this rigorous academic path.

Our teachers, too, are continuing their hard work, picking up right where they left off in their preparations for the MYP authorization. We are proud of the results from the May 2024 IB exams, as our students achieved scores above the world average in most subjects. The MBIS Diploma pass rate stands at 96%, compared to the world average of 80%. The average points obtained by the Class of 2024 is 32 out of 45, surpassing the world average of 30.32. Even so, we remain dedicated to further elevating our standards.





## News from the IB:

The IB is proud to announce that the American Council on Education (ACE) recommends that colleges and universities award at least 3 credits for IB scores of 4 or higher for all the SL subjects reviewed. This external review validates the rigor and high standards of IB qualifications.

HL versus SL courses (240/150 teaching hours): SL courses are not simplified versions of the course, but HL courses offer a greater body of knowledge and include more assessment components. HL courses allow students to spend more time studying subjects they are more interested in.

On our March newsletter, I shared the acceptances our students secured from some of the world's most prestigious institutions, reflecting their hard work, resilience, and academic excellence. It is now time to share their final destinations.

Canada remains a popular choice, with all our applicants receiving offers. Keila will attend the University of British Columbia (UBC), while Sanu, Samara, and Kaio will begin their studies at the University of Toronto, focusing on Industrial Engineering, Architecture, and Business, respectively.

The United Kingdom was a favored destination, with two students embarking on exciting journeys. Sivaranjani will study Biomedical Science at the University of Manchester, and Momoe will explore Product and Furniture Design at Kingston University.

Within Japan, we have received numerous acceptances including Sophia University, International Christian University, and Nagoya University. We also have students heading to Purdue University and Cal Poly to pursue Mechanical Engineering.

We are immensely proud of each and every one of them and look forward to hearing about their future successes as they embark on this next chapter of their lives. 

## Welcome to MBIS!

More than 100 new students joined our school this year. We held lunch gatherings for new students in each grade from G2 through G10. During these sessions, everyone got to know each other and was introduced to the counseling services at MBIS. I'd like to share what we discussed to help them better adjust to their new environment.

# Culture Shock and the Adjustment Process Everyone experiences some level of culture shock when entering a new environment. Culture shock generally has four stages:

## Honeymoon Stage

Everything is new - your school, friends, surroundings, and classes. You feel excited, enthusiastic, and optimistic as you explore and adapt to your new environment.at home in your new environment.

## Culture Shock Stage

You may start feeling frustrated, annoyed, or anxious about everyday differences. It's normal to feel confused, homesick, and disconnected during this stage.

## **Adjustment Stage**

You begin to settle into your new life. You might have made a few friends by now, which helps you understand and feel more comfortable in your new environment. You may still face challenges, but you're becoming better at handling them.

## Adaptation Stage

You feel comfortable in your new environment. The feelings of loneliness and isolation fade, and you get used to your new daily activities and friends. While you may not feel the same excitement as in the Honeymoon Stage, you start to feel a strong sense of belonging and finally feel at home in your new environment.





## Tips for Adjusting to a New Environment

Use Your Buddy: Your buddy is there to help you. If you feel like you and your buddy aren't a good match, tell your teacher. The teacher can find you a new buddy. It's okay to ask to change your buddy!

Explore the School: Walk around the school with other students. Knowing where things are and which teachers are where will help you feel more comfortable.

Talk to Others: Even if you're shy, try talking to other students. You can say, "Hi, I'm new here. Can I join you?" Ask them where they live, their hobbies, or how long they've been at the school.

Meet Different Groups: You don't have to stick with the first group you meet. Try getting to know different groups to find where you feel most comfortable.

Join Activities: Our school has many after-school activities. These are great opportunities to meet new people, so try to join in.

Take Your Time with Friendships: Don't rush to find a new best friend. It's okay to take your time. Friendships grow over time, so take it slow and let them develop naturally.






