MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD OF LOWER SCHOOL


As we wrap up our first month of school, I am thrilled to see how happy and adjusted our students are. They have settled in beautifully and truly seem to feel that school is their second home.

IB Education: Education for a Better World



Report on "Growing Up Online": Susan McLean's Cyber Safety Session

Internationally known cyber safety expert Susan McLean visited MBIS and gave several important talks to our community. On September 30th and October 1st, she held three sessions for students (Grades 4-6, Grades 7-9, and Grades 10-12), a special seminar for parents, and a professional development session for teachers.

The parents' session, "Growing Up Online," was informative and eye-opening. Susan shared her deep understanding of the online world, and many parents were shocked to learn about the real dangers their children might face online. She explained technology's good and bad sides and gave parents the information they needed to help keep their children safe.

Some of the key topics Susan discussed included:

- Reality & Risk: Understanding the real risks of the online world. It's not a question of "if" something bad will happen, but "when."
- What are kids doing online?: Learning about popular apps and platforms such as TikTok, OmeTV, Discord, Yolo, and Wink that children use or hear about.
- Online Grooming: What it is, how it happens, and warning signs to look for.
- Cyberbullying: What cyberbullying looks like, how it happens, and how to respond if your child is a victim. Susan also talked about the legal consequences.
- Sharing Nudes: The serious emotional and legal risks of sending inappropriate pictures.
- **Sextortion**: A dangerous crime where boys and sometimes girls are tricked into sending inappropriate photos and then blackmailed.
- Al-generated nudes: How fake, computer-made images are treated by the law.
- Problematic Gaming: How to control your child's screen time and manage excessive gaming.
- Exposure to harmful content: How to protect children from harmful websites that show inappropriate or dangerous content, like pornography or sites that promote self-harm or eating disorders.

Over 90% of online problems happen at home, not at school. Parents are responsible for keeping their children safe online and ensuring their children do not harm others.

Children are very social online. While they may not talk to strangers in person, they do so freely online. Most people who cause harm to children online are strangers. Your child may call these people "online friends," but there is no such thing as an online friend. This term is just a way to describe strangers who seem nice. People who want to cause trouble online use bait, waiting for someone to fall into their trap.

The internet makes it easier for criminals to reach more potential victims. They connect with children, gain their trust, and use it against them—all while staying hidden. If your child is not talking to strangers online, they are less likely to face these dangers. Hence, you need to monitor their online use to prevent that happens.

If your child is being harmed online, report the abuse to the platform, then block the person immediately (except in grooming cases). Many new apps appear and disappear quickly, so it's important to control what apps your child downloads and regularly check what is on their device to ensure there are no issues.

This session was a wake-up call for many parents. Even those who thought they were aware of their child's online activities learned new and important information. Susan's honest and clear message reminded everyone that the cyber world, while full of opportunities, also comes with serious risks. Parents need to stay informed and take an active role in their child's digital lives. With the right knowledge and awareness, parents can guide their children safely through the online world and help protect them from becoming victims of its hidden dangers.

Susan encouraged students to:

- 1. Tell a trusted adult.
- 2. Keep a record of what happened to show the adult.
- 3. Report the problem to the platform or app.
- 4. Block and delete the bully or the person causing harm.
- 5. Don't respond or fight back with mean comments.
- 6. Speak up and be brave—tell someone!

As part of our inquiry into the PYP transdisciplinary theme Who We Are, the Grade 3 classes recently went on a community walk around the Suma area. This activity aimed to expand on their understanding of identity, relationships, and the roles individuals play within their communities.

During the walk, students had the opportunity to observe and reflect on the people and places that shape their local environment. In small groups, they worked to create community maps that highlighted various community helpers who support our neighborhood. Each student took on a specific role—one as the "photographer" to capture images and the other as the "researcher" to gather information and take notes. This collaborative effort not only deepened their understanding of how we are all connected but more importantly, it highlighted the contributions that each of us bring to make our community thrive.

A key stop on our journey was Suma Seaside Park, where students took a moment to reflect and brainstorm ideas for their maps. This outdoor setting allowed them to engage with their surroundings in a meaningful way and practice being open-minded as they considered different perspectives on community helpers. MBIS Seniors Dive into Scientific Exploration with IBDP Internal Assessments

At Marist Brothers International School, our seniors have just finished the rough draft of their Internal Assessments (IAs) in Biology, Environmental Systems and Societies (ESS), Chemistry, and Physics. These IAs are an essential part of the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP), allowing students to conduct original scientific investigations and apply the knowledge they've gained over two years of study. The IA is 20% of the final grade for IBDP Science Students.

The IA in Science encourages students to design and execute their own experiments, collect data, and critically analyze their findings. It's a rigorous but rewarding process that fosters curiosity, problem-solving, and a deeper understanding of the scientific method. By working independently, students hone their skills in planning, conducting experiments, and interpreting data, ultimately developing the qualities of a true scientist.

This year's seniors have chosen fascinating topics that showcase their creativity and dedication. Here are a few highlights:



Jay Muto has chosen to investigate the effects of hydrogen peroxide on plant growth. His project, "How do the varying concentrations of hydrogen peroxide (0.0, 0.5, 1.0, 1.5, 2.0%) affect the germination rate (%) of Vigna Radiata seeds and the radicle length (mm) of the sprout over 5 days?" examines how different concentrations of this common compound affect the early growth of mung bean seeds.



Priska Khatri is delving into the world of microbiology. Her IA, titled "How does the type of natural sweetener affect the growth of saccharomyces cerevisiae (baker's yeast) on agar plates?" focuses on how different natural sweeteners influence the growth rate of yeast, with potential implications for baking and fermentation industries.



Jin Ushio is investigating the thermal properties of different types of milk in coffee. His research, titled "How does the amount and the types of milk in a coffee affect its specific heat capacity?" explores how varying types and amounts of milk impact the heat retention in a cup of coffee.

Our seniors have embraced the challenge of their IBDP IAs, demonstrating a keen interest in scientific inquiry. Their work reflects the spirit of excellence, innovation, and care that we nurture at Marist Brothers International School. We look forward to seeing the results of their research and celebrating their achievements.

Developing Design Skills with Isometric and Orthographic Drawing

This month, students in all of our design courses explored important drawing techniques used by designers: isometric and orthographic drawing. These skills help designers share their ideas clearly, so others can understand and recreate them.

Students learned about the difference between sketches, which are used for quick ideas or personal use, and technical drawings, which provide more detail and are shared with others. While sketches allow more freedom and creativity, technical drawings need to be accurate, clear, and well-labeled so that others can use them to build the design.

To practice this, students created their own structures using K'nex toys and made detailed orthographic drawings of their designs. These drawings were then given to other groups, who had to build the design using only the technical plans. This activity showed students how important it is to create clear drawings with enough detail for someone else to understand and follow.

By the end of the unit, students had a better understanding of how to use both sketches and technical drawings in their design work. These skills are important for communicating design ideas clearly and effectively, and we are excited to see students apply them in future projects!



Grade 6 Value Experiments

As we begin a new year of art explorations, 6th graders have been delving deep into drawing techniques, focusing on value. How do we use our drawing materials to create form with value? How do our material choices change and inform our art making? These questions led to our explorations into the potential and properties of charcoal and chalk. 6th grade students also began to look at ellipses as a way to accurately render cylindrical objects. As we finish experimenting with our media and skills, we are beginning to inquire about how the expression we convey through ritual and play changes materials into artistry, and are starting to learn about mindful art practices rooted in religious traditions from around the world.

Exploring Sculpture and 3D Art – We Love to Get Messy!

Our Lower School students have been buzzing with creativity as they dive into exciting PYP art projects. It's been a wonderful start to the year, and some students have even completed their first pieces!

In Grades 1, 2 and 4, we've been exploring the fascinating world of three-dimensional art. This hands-on experience not only nurtures creativity but also helps develop problem-solving and engineering skills—an essential part of the inquiry process.

Grade 1 students are learning about the anatomy of bees, and for many, this has been their first experience getting truly messy in art class! While some students were hesitant to get their hands sticky with glue and paper pulp, they've embraced the challenge and enjoyed learning how to build the shape of a sculpture. They've started constructing the bee's body, understanding how armatures support their creations—a key foundational skill.



In Grade 2, students are taking their skills a step further by crafting paint tube sculptures. Each student has chosen a color and learned to follow more complex instructions to shape and assemble their sculptures. This process not only teaches them about form and structure but also builds perseverance as they work through the detailed steps.







Grade 4 students are creating vibrant alebrijes heads, inspired by the traditional Mexican folk art of fantastical creatures. They've carefully designed and built armatures from cardboard, and now they are mastering the technique of papier-mâché. Working with wet materials can be tricky, especially when trying to maintain the structure of their designs, but the students are showing resilience and creativity throughout the process.

Throughout the year, all grade levels will have opportunities to work in 3D, developing important skills like collaboration, experimentation, and persistence. These projects offer students the chance to express themselves in new ways and stretch their imaginations.

If you can, encourage your child to build, sculpt, and create at home. Working in 3D is not only fun but also wonderful for developing growing minds!



In Memory of Br. Ramon Bereicua

September 1, 2024 was the 2nd death anniversary of Br. Ramon Bereicua. Originally from the Basque region of Spain, he was assigned to the then-newly established Marist Brothers School in Kobe, Japan in 1959. He stayed here until 2018, marking almost 60 years as a missionary in Japan. He was a linguist, fluent in at least 6 different languages including French, which he taught beautifully, as well as Japanese and other Romance languages. He loved to play music, and his instrument of choice was the accordion.

As a Marist Brother present here in Suma since the early years of the MBIS's existence, many of our graduates knew him well and would come back to visit him even after he retired from teaching and school administration in 2004. During the aftermath of the 1995 Great Hanshin-Awaji earthquake, Br. Ramon and Br. Augustine would become instrumental in rebuilding the school with the help of generous sponsors, alumni, and the Diocese of Osaka. We remember Br. Ramon's memory through our prayers.
